# COMMUNITY SERVICE

Whilst our initial efforts for the new Rotary year centred on our contribution to the broader Greater Shepparton community through the hugely successful Biggest Men's Lunch, in late August (organised by the Rotary Club of Shepparton South), the devastating effects of the force of nature were to hit our local community in October.

In the ensuing floods many homes were severely affected and individual and family lives were thrown into turmoil. Club members, along with people from all walks of life, joined together to provide the immediate help that was so necessary at the time. Sandbagging, ensuring people were safe and attempting to protect properties were the immediate tasks. As the floodwaters began to recede the extent of the damage became apparent.

With the help of funds donated by 4 Melbourne clubs (Rosanna, Pascoe Vale, Whittlesea and Knox City) we have been able to distribute almost \$20,000 to people in need. This has been in the

form of pillows, single bed quilts, sleeping bags, tents, sleeping mats, doonas, vouchers (grocery, bus travel to Shepparton, fuel, hardware, and gardening) and food hampers.

The effects of the flood event are ongoing and to this end financial support has been given through Mooroopna Primary School and Mooroopna Park Primary to allow the students of badly affected families to attend school camps and excursions, and buy uniforms/shoes.

So that children did not miss out at Xmas time toys were donated through the Life Church. Instead of Kris Kringle at our Xmas party we brought toys to be given via the Life Church. This was augmented by \$1000 from our Flood Relief fund. In total, toys to the value of about \$1600 were given towards providing further family relief at Xmas time.

Ongoing assistance is being provided to Mooroopna Park Primary School as staff attempt to develop a

Community Garden (vegetable) as a learning tool for students, and as a communal meeting place for parents. This latter aspect is a little slow in taking off. A working bee was held in early March to set up and sow the garden beds. Richard and Merinda Speedy have diligently maintained the beds since to the point where produce is now being used by the School chef in producing healthy student food. A further working bee was held in early June to clean out a garden shed.

The Combined Services Dinner in March was a great success, again, with very good attendance from most local groups. Result : Gurney to be bought for Shepparton Search and Rescue with Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions contributing an equal share.

Providing BBQ's continues to be a source of useful funds. This year we have cooked for Bunnings, Jiu-jitsu Club (pre Xmas), Greater Shepparton Secondary School (Harmony event) and Hits FM.

The recording of Post Codes at the Converge and Luminare events has followed on from previous years and is supported by a number of our members.

A very important event in the history of this Club was the afternoon tea on a Sunday in April (2nd)

when Paul Harris Fellow awards were given to Pat Treacy and Geoff Hill. These were long overdue, a big surprise to both men, and humbly received. Pat, who was our last living Charter member, passed away shortly after following a lengthy illness.

**This coming year** should see the Club continue with, or begin the following:

- The establishment of an Outdoor Fitness equipment circuit – a slow process with a number of 'hurdles' to jump.
- ROMP – support for the establishment of a local Myeloma nurse in the area.
- Support MPPS in the establishment of a Bike Safety Learning track – providing a Cubby at \$2800 approx.
- Support the move towards increasing the conversation about what to do with the Mooroopna Secondary site.

**A large % of what we do as a Club we do for our local community, and that is what we do in Rotary. I would encourage all members to become involved in this area as your ideas, small or big, may lead to something that has a positive impact on the community.**

# INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

On October 8th, 2022 we organised a Gala Dinner and Auction in conjunction with David and Heidi van Maanen of bYoga. The dinner raised \$18000, which added to the \$5000 which had been allocated from disbursements. This made a total of \$23000 or US\$14000.

Combining with Rotary clubs in Queensland, Sydney, Melbourne, Cork-Ireland, and Redmond USA we contributed towards a Global Grant of

over US\$200,000 for toilets and clean water in Cambodia. Our \$14k was matched by \$10k from District 9790 and \$8k from Rotary International.

In 2023 we have allocated \$2500 to Cambodian Clean Water and Toilets.

We have also allocated \$500 to each of Rotarians against Malaria, Operation Cleft, ROMAC, Interplast and Children First.

# MOORoopNA COMMUNITY TREE

It was January 2020 that Past President Belinda King came up with the idea of the Community Tree which was presented to the club in February of 2020 by way of a PowerPoint presentation.

Later this year, the project will complete with commissioned sculpture put in place.

The location is directly opposite Adrian Vigliaturo's business, Mooroopna Pizzeria, in front of the water tower (east side), in the semi-circle garden bed, top of the curve and centred against the entrance from the car park.

Council required us to obtain a location plan.

We asked Leigh Findlay, Managing Director of CAF Consulting if his company would put together a location plan for free, and thankfully they did.

This was a key to progressing the project and for that, we thank Leigh for facilitating this and obviously the generosity of CAF.

We have had many emails with the sculptor to get this project back on track.

On 19 April 2023 he met at the location to discuss the next steps with both the club and the contractor, Cleaves, who were putting in the sub-surface footings based on the engineering requirements.

Regional Roads Victoria endorsed the project.

They also suggested we work out if a Working Within Road Reserve (WWRR) was required.

We put in the application with VicRoads but turns out it was not required as the location would not impact traffic flow.

Council agreed to the project but struggled to confirm next steps.

They suggested a Memorandum of Understanding which would state obligations on them and us.

There were no terms provided but a request to ensure the MoU covered off on insurance obligations on the club and to maintain the commissioned works twice annually.

That was prepared, provided for review and comment and we were advised it was fine to proceed.

Last minute change when the Risk Department

at Council requested amendments, including not requiring an MoU but an Agreement.

The revised Agreement was modified accordingly and sent back.

Council then engaged Rob Crow from Crow Legal to vet that document and Rob requested some modifications to the recitals which is essentially the background.

It was to show that whilst Council maintain the location on behalf of the State Government (DEECA/DELWP), they have divested responsibility to us so that our insurance covers it and we maintain it.

That Agreement will be sent to Rob shortly, but its not urgent given the Council consent to proceed.

The club treasurer will know revenue versus expenses but suspect we need more funds.

A lot of the businesses that showed initial interest, have been billed.

There should only be one payment left to be made to the sculptor, which is great.

We now need members to buy a leaf or bark for a position of the tree sculpture.

That flyer has been sent by email but contact me if you want to know anything further.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

The year has been a busy one financially for the club with over 400 bank transactions from July 1st 2022 to 14th June 2023. I initially used MYOB with the assistance of the previous Treasurer Pete Kelton. I really struggled with the complexity of the program and was also quite concerned with the cost of using it – more than \$600 pa.

Rather than persist with MYOB I downloaded all bank transactions and inserted them into an Excel spreadsheet and categorised them with comments. It was then a simple process to sort all transactions as required. Next Rotary Year the incoming treasurer will be using the Xero accounting software package.

The balance of the Faulkner Bequest account is \$44176.00 and has interest due in a week or so. There has been no activity with the account since July 1st 2022.

We opened a separate bank account for the Satellite

Club on 23rd August 2022 to keep their funds independent of ours and to simplify bookkeeping. Since the group was chartered as The Rotaract Club of Goulburn Murray we have continued to look after their banking and will continue to do so until they have an ABN and open their own account.

The two major changes to our banking has been GMCU's decision to cease the use of cheques and our move to the Square Reader. Almost all transactions are now made via direct transfer. This has meant obtaining Account names, BSB and Account numbers for all people and organisations we would normally pay by cheque. That has been very time consuming and not always straightforward but is now setup for the next treasurer. The other concern is the use of the Square Readers and knowing who is using them and for what purpose as no detail is provided when monies are deposited into our accounts from them.
